

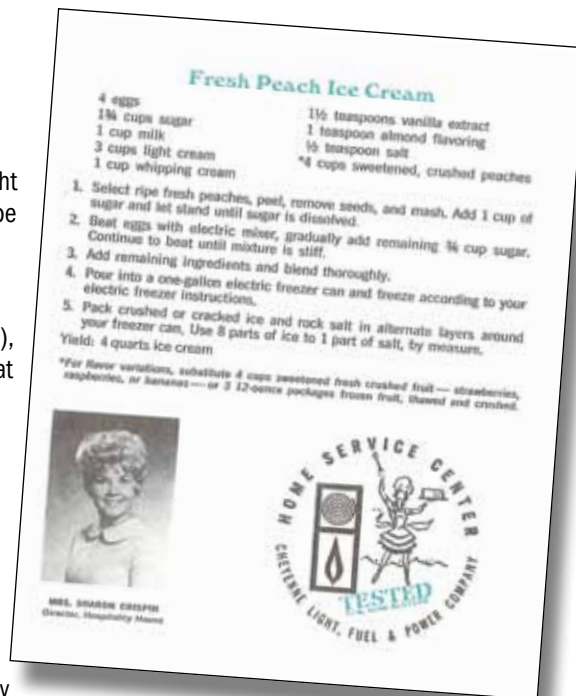
## Customer Finds Peach Ice Cream from 1971 Cheyenne Light Customer Newsletter

## Weatherizing Your Home Is As Easy As 1-2-3

The average house – even a well-insulated house – contains cracks and gaps between building materials that allow outside air and humidity to enter. In the winter, those gaps may make the house drafty and chilly. And a leaky house wastes energy throughout the year.

Here are a few easy steps you can take to weatherize your home as winter creeps into our region.

1. Insulate. Insulation added to outside walls, floors and attics is one of the most practical and cost-effective ways to cut energy costs. A water heater blanket and hot water pipe insulation will also help with energy savings.
2. Seal cracks around windows and doors. Caulking and weather-stripping windows, doors and seams on sliding glass or French doors that lead outside are easy and inexpensive ways to keep heat in and cold out. Easy-to-use window film kits can cut cold air leaking around windows that don't seal well.
3. Maintain your heating system. Change the filter to your furnace monthly and schedule a check of your heating system each year to prevent breakdowns and unwanted energy costs.
